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- 1 HEARING OFFICER STUDER: Good evening. My
- 2 name is Dean Studer and I am the hearing officer for
- 3 the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency. On
- 4 behalf of Director Lisa Bonnett I welcome you to
- 5 tonight's hearing. My purpose tonight is to ensure
- 6 that this proceeding runs properly, according to
- 7 rules and is conducted in a fair and efficient
- 8 manner. Personally, I will not be responding to
- 9 specific technical issues related to the permit, but
- 10 will defer such issues to the technical staff with
- 11 me.
- 12 This is an informational hearing
- 13 before the Illinois EPA in the matter of an air
- 14 pollution control construction permit for Winnebago
- 15 Reclamation Services for a new waste disposal area.
- 16 The permit would address -- the permit would address
- 17 this new disposal area which would be located west
- 18 of the existing disposal area at the Winnebago
- 19 Landfill and is referenced as the West Expansion
- 20 Unit. The permit would also address the gas
- 21 collection and control system that would be
- 22 installed to control landfill gas generated by this
- 23 new disposal area. The Illinois EPA has reviewed
- 24 the permit application and has made a preliminary

- 1 determination that a permit can be issued. A draft
- 2 permit was prepared and posted on the Illinois EPA
- 3 website on the December 4th, 2014. The official
- 4 public notice comment period commenced with the
- 5 publication of the notice of the comment period and
- 6 public hearing in the Rockford Register Star on
- 7 December 6, 2014.
- 8 The Illinois EPA is holding this
- 9 hearing for the purpose of accepting comments from
- 10 the public on the proposed issuance of the air
- 11 pollution control construction permit for this
- 12 project prior to making a final determination on the
- 13 application. This public hearing is being held
- 14 under the provisions of the Illinois EPA's procedure
- 15 for permit and closure plan hearings, which could be
- 16 found at 35 Illinois Administrative Code, Part 166,
- 17 Subpart A. Copies of these procedures can be
- 18 accessed on the website for the Illinois Pollution
- 19 Control Board at www.ipcb.state.il.us, or, if you do
- 20 not have easy access from the Internet, copies can
- 21 be obtained from me on request.
- 22 An informational public hearing means
- 23 exactly that. It is an opportunity for you to
- 24 provide information to the Illinois EPA concerning

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- 1 this permit. This is not a contested case hearing.
- I would like to explain how tonight's
- 3 hearing is going to proceed. First I will have the
- 4 Illinois EPA staff person introduce himself and
- 5 identify his responsibilities within the agency in
- 6 regards to this permitting action. Then Kunj Patel,
- 7 the permit writer, will make opening remarks
- 8 regarding the project and draft permit. I will then
- 9 give some details on how comments will be taken.
- 10 And this will be followed by comments from the
- 11 public.
- 12 You are not required to provide your
- 13 comments orally. Written comments are given the
- 14 same consideration and may be submitted to the
- 15 Illinois EPA at any time during the comment period,
- 16 which runs through February 19, 2015. All comments
- 17 submitted by mail must be postmarked no later than
- 18 February 19, 2015. Although we will continue to
- 19 accept comments through that date, tonight is the
- 20 only time that we will accept oral comments.
- 21 The decision date in this matter will
- 22 depend upon the number and nature of comments
- 23 received, as well as other factors.
- 24 Any person who wants to make an oral

- 1 comment may do so as long as they have registered
- 2 that the comments are relevant to the draft permit
- 3 and time allows. If you have not completed a
- 4 registration card at this point, please see either
- 5 Jillian Hawkins or Brad Frost in the registration
- 6 area and either of them can provide you with a
- 7 registration card. Please be sure to check the
- 8 appropriate box in the card if you decided to make
- 9 comments at the hearing this evening. If you have
- 10 lengthy comments, it may be helpful to submit them
- 11 to me in writing before the end of the comment
- 12 period, and I will insure that they are included in
- 13 the hearing record as an exhibit.
- 14 Please keep your comments relevant to
- 15 the draft permit. If your comments fall outside of
- 16 the scope of this hearing, I may ask you to proceed
- 17 to the next relevant issue.
- 18 In addition, I would like to stress
- 19 we want to avoid unnecessary repetition. If anyone
- 20 before you has already presented comments that are
- 21 contained in your comments, please skip over those
- 22 issues when you speak. Once a point is made, it
- 23 makes no difference if the point is made once or
- 24 whether it is made 99 times; it will be considered

- 1 on its merit and will be reflected only once in the
- 2 responsive summary. The final decision of the
- 3 Illinois EPA will not be based on how many people
- 4 support or oppose issuance of this permit, but
- 5 rather upon the record and whether the facility will
- 6 comply with applicable laws, regulations and
- 7 requirements for permit issuance.
- 8 Illinois EPA staff will attempt to
- 9 respond during this hearing to the issues raised
- 10 tonight, but I will not allow the speakers to argue
- 11 or engage in a prolonged dialogue with our panel or
- 12 with any other person present this evening.
- 13 Responses made by the Illinois EPA staff during this
- 14 hearing will be finalized and provided in a more
- 15 formal manner in the written responsiveness summary
- 16 which will be made available at the time that a
- 17 final decision is reached in this matter.
- 18 All who complete a registration card
- 19 or submit written comments in this matter will be
- 20 notified of the final decision of this matter and of
- 21 the availability of the responsiveness summary. In
- 22 the responsiveness summary, the Illinois EPA will
- 23 respond to all significant issues that were raised
- 24 at this hearing or submitted to me in writing prior

- 1 to the close of the comment period. Again, the
- 2 written record in this matter will close on
- 3 February 19, 2015. I will accept comments as long
- 4 as they are postmarked by that date.
- 5 While the record is open, all
- 6 relevant comments, documents, and data will be
- 7 placed into the hearing record as an exhibit.
- 8 Please send all written documents to my attention.
- 9 You can send them to Dean Studer, Hearing Officer,
- 10 Office of Community Relations regarding Winnebago
- 11 landfill, Illinois EPA, 1021 North Grand Avenue
- 12 East, P.O. Box 19276, Springfield, Illinois
- 13 62794-9276. This address is also given on the
- 14 public notice for the hearing tonight.
- 15 We have a court reporter here who is
- 16 taking a record of this hearing for the purposes of
- 17 our administrative record. Once I receive the final
- 18 transcript from the court reporter, I will have it
- 19 posted on the Agency's webpage in the same general
- 20 area where the hearing notice and other documents in
- 21 this proceeding have been posted. For the benefit
- 22 of the court reporter, please keep the general
- 23 background noise in the room to a minimum so she can
- 24 hear everything said. Also, please silence all cell

- 1 phones and pagers at this time if you have not
- 2 already done so.
- I will now ask Illinois EPA staff to
- 4 introduce himself and briefly explain his role in
- 5 this permit application. And this will be filed by
- 6 Kunj Patel making a short opening statement.
- 7 MR. ROMAINE: Good evening. My name is
- 8 Chris Romaine. I am manager of the construction
- 9 area of the air permit section.
- 10 MR. PATEL: Good evening, Ladies and
- 11 Gentlemen. Welcome to this evening's hearing. My
- 12 name is Kunj Patel. I am a permit engineer with the
- 13 Bureau of Air. And I work with Chris. I will give
- 14 you a brief description of the application and the
- 15 proposed draft permit for new waste disposal area of
- 16 the Winnebago Landfill, which is the subject of
- 17 tonight's hearing.
- 18 As Mr. Studer has explained,
- 19 Winnebago Reclamation Services has submitted an
- 20 application to the Illinois EPA, Bureau of Air, for
- 21 an air pollution construction permit for a new waste
- 22 disposal area, the West Expansion Unit. This new
- 23 waste disposal area is already permitted by the
- 24 Illinois EPA, Bureau of Land, and will be located

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- 1 west of the existing waste disposal areas at this
- 2 landfill. The requested permit from the Bureau of
- 3 Air would address the collection and control of the
- 4 landfill gas generated from the new disposal area.
- 5 The landfill gas generated by large
- 6 municipal waste landfills, like Winnebago Landfill,
- 7 is routinely collected by the gas wells that are
- 8 drilled through the cover material placed on top of
- 9 the waste. The gas that is collected from the wells
- 10 is then ducted to a control system. Flares are
- 11 routinely used to control the collective landfill
- 12 gas because the gas is combustible, with about half
- 13 the fuel value of natural gas. The combustion of
- 14 the landfill gas destroys organic compounds in the
- 15 gas. Combustion converts the sulfur in the gas,
- 16 which is present as hydrogen sulfide, to less
- 17 noxious sulfur dioxide.
- 18 As described in the application,
- 19 Winnebago Services would control the landfill gas
- 20 collected from this new disposal area by installing
- 21 a new flare adjacent to this disposal area and a
- 22 sulfur removal system to lower the sulfur content of
- 23 the collective landfill gas prior to being flared.
- 24 The Illinois EPA has reviewed this

- 1 application and made a preliminary determination
- 2 that the application meets the applicable
- 3 requirement. In particular, the sulfur removal
- 4 system would keep the sulfur dioxide emissions from
- 5 this West Expansion Unit below the level at which
- 6 emissions would be considered significant under the
- 7 federal rules for prevention of significant
- 8 deterioration, which is under 40 CFR 52.21.
- 9 Winnebago Services has also proposed
- 10 an enhanced program to collect the landfill gas from
- 11 the West Expansion Unit. This program would include
- 12 use of temporary horizontal gas collectors, early
- 13 installation of permanent gas collection wells, and
- 14 accelerated installation of final cover material.
- 15 These measures will act to improve the effectiveness
- 16 of the gas collection system. Accordingly, the
- 17 Illinois EPA has prepared a draft of air pollution
- 18 control construction permit that it would propose to
- 19 issue for the West Expansion Unit.
- 20 The draft permit that the Illinois
- 21 EPA has prepared would also require enhanced
- 22 monitoring for the level of methane measured at the
- 23 at the surface of the landfill, based on the rules
- 24 adopted by the California Air Resources Board for

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- 1 control of methane emissions from municipal waste
- 2 landfills. Methane is a major constituent of
- 3 landfill gas. The level of methane at the surface
- 4 of a landfill is an indicator of effectiveness of
- 5 the gas collection system.
- 6 These monitoring requirements would
- 7 be more stringent than the applicable requirements
- 8 in the current federal New Source Performance
- 9 Standards for the municipal solid waste landfills,
- 10 under 40 CFR 60 Subpart www.
- 11 We look forward to your questions or
- 12 comments on this proposed permit. And once again,
- 13 thank you for attending tonight's hearing.
- 14 HEARING OFFICER STUDER: Thank you, Kunj.
- 15 I didn't ask, can everyone in back hear me? Okay.
- While the issues raised tonight may
- 17 be heartfelt concerns to many of us in attendance,
- 18 applause is not appropriate during the course of
- 19 this hearing. Booing, hissing, jeering, and other
- 20 responses are not appropriate and will not be
- 21 allowed this evening.
- 22 Secondly, I am not going to allow
- 23 statements to be made tonight that do not relate to
- 24 the issues involved with the air permit. Statements

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- 1 and comments that are of a personal nature or
- 2 reflect on the character or motive of a person or a
- 3 group of people are not appropriate in this hearing.
- 4 If statements or comments begin to drift into this
- 5 area or begin to drift away from issues involved
- 6 with this permit, I may interrupt the person
- 7 speaking and ask that they proceed to their next
- 8 relevant issue. As hearing officer I intend to
- 9 treat everyone here tonight in a respectful and
- 10 professional manner. I ask that members of the
- 11 panel and public do the same. If the conduct of
- 12 persons attending this hearing should become unruly,
- 13 I am authorized to adjourn this hearing should
- 14 actions warrant. In such a case, the Illinois EPA
- 15 would still accept written comments through the
- 16 close of the comment period, which is February 19,
- 17 2015.
- 18 We are here tonight to listen to
- 19 environmental issues associated with the air permit.
- 20 You may disagree with or object to some of the
- 21 statements and comments made tonight, but this is a
- 22 public hearing and everyone has a right to express
- 23 their comments on this manner.
- 24 Again, written comments are given the

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- 1 same consideration as oral comments received during
- 2 this hearing and may be submitted to the Illinois
- 3 EPA at any time within the public comment period.
- 4 However, tonight is the only time that we will
- 5 accept oral comments.
- 6 Members of the public will be allowed
- 7 nine minutes per speaker. If everyone has had an
- 8 opportunity to speak and time allows, I may allow
- 9 those who initially did not want to speak to do so.
- 10 When it is your turn to speak, I will
- 11 call your name. Please come forward to the
- 12 microphone in the middle and state your name and any
- 13 governmental body, organizations or association that
- 14 you represent. If you are not representing a
- 15 governmental body, an organization, or an
- 16 association, you may simply indicate that you are a
- 17 concerned citizen or a member of the public.
- 18 For the benefit of the court
- 19 reporter, I ask that you spell your last name. If
- 20 there are alternate spellings for your first name,
- 21 you may also spell your first name. Once you spell
- 22 your name, I will start timing you and you will have
- 23 nine minutes to complete your comments.
- 24 I ask that while you are speaking

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- 1 that you direct your attention to the hearing panel
- 2 and to the court reporter to ensure that an accurate
- 3 record of your comments is made. Prolonged dialogue
- 4 with members of the hearing panel or others here in
- 5 attendance tonight will not be permitted. Comments
- 6 directed to the public are also not allowed.
- 7 Again, I remind everyone that the
- 8 focus of this hearing is the environmental issues
- 9 associated with the air pollution control
- 10 construction permit for the expansion unit.
- 11 Are there any questions regarding the
- 12 procedures that will be used regarding the
- 13 conducting of the hearing this evening?
- No. Okay.
- 15 With that said, the first speaker is
- 16 Thomas Lamb. If Mr. Lamb would come forward to the
- 17 mic.
- 18 MR. THOMAS LAMB: There's a big question
- 19 in my mind -- oh, Thomas Lamb, L-A-M-B, as in sheep.
- 20 New Milford resident.
- 21 Reading through your material --
- 22 HEARING OFFICER STUDER: Can you spell --
- 23 okay. It's Thomas Lamb, normal spelling? You said
- 24 that.

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- 1 MR. TOM GROENINGER: Like a sheep.
- 2 HEARING OFFICER STUDER: Go ahead.
- 3 MR. THOMAS LAMB: Reading through your
- 4 material, I find I have to do research because I
- 5 don't understand some of these chemical symbols,
- 6 et cetera. While I do have questions on them, I'm
- 7 not intelligent enough right at this moment to ask
- 8 the questions I should be asking. So that's it.
- 9 HEARING OFFICER STUDER: Thank you,
- 10 Mr. Lamb.
- 11 Diane, is it Swiderski?
- 12 MS. DIANE SWIDERSKI: You did well.
- 13 Hi. Diane Swiderski,
- 14 S-W-I-D-E-R-S-K-I.
- 15 I am --
- 16 HEARING OFFICER STUDER: Your back is to
- 17 the people, so I am going to ask that you try to
- 18 speak into the microphone and that way --
- 19 MS. DIANE SWIDERSKI: Okay. I am puzzled
- 20 as to where exactly this new proposed site is.
- 21 MR. PATEL: It is west of the -- west of
- 22 the existing north landfill and south landfill.
- 23 MS. DIANE SWIDERSKI: So will it be closer
- 24 to Baxter Road, further away from Baxter Road? So

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- 1 west means it is going to be closer to 251?
- 2 MR. PATEL: Tom?
- 3 MR. VARSHO: The West Expansion Unit will
- 4 be adjacent to 251 further south of Baxter.
- 5 Essentially it will be at the intersection of 251
- 6 and Edson Road.
- 7 MS. DIANE SWIDERSKI: I'm not sure where
- 8 Edson Road is.
- 9 MR. VARSHO: Did you see county line?
- 10 Does that help you out?
- 11 MR. THOMAS LAMB: Across the street from
- 12 Penn (phonetic) Station.
- MS. DIANE SWIDERSKI: Oh, okay.
- 14 And how big compared to what they
- 15 have already will this be?
- MR. PATEL: The capacity of this West
- 17 Expansion Unit would be approximately about 8.3
- 18 million cubic yards at least.
- 19 MS. DIANE SWIDERSKI: Is that a half,
- 20 mile, quarter mile? Are you taking into
- 21 consideration the depth of it?
- 22 MR. PATEL: We are basically permitting
- 23 based on capacity of how much waste they can deposit
- 24 into that.

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- 1 MS. DIANE SWIDERSKI: How many acres? I
- 2 am just trying to put it into a context that I could
- 3 understand.
- 4 HEARING OFFICER STUDER: One of the
- 5 reasons why it's so difficult for that is because
- 6 those are actually questions that are more involved
- 7 with the land permit issue and this is the air
- 8 permit, so that it's --
- 9 MS. DIANE SWIDERSKI: Yeah, I'm just
- 10 trying to --
- 11 HEARING OFFICER STUDER: I understand.
- 12 We're trying to get responses for you.
- 13 MR. ROMAINE: It's about 60 acres.
- 14 MS. DIANE SWIDERSKI: And it's pretty much
- 15 behind, I am thinking of Baxter Road, it's -- I
- 16 understand now. Okay.
- 17 That I believe was all the questions
- 18 I have. The flares will be back in that area?
- 19 MR. ROMAINE: Yes.
- 20 MS. DIANE SWIDERSKI: How many of them do
- 21 you think?
- 22 MR. ROMAINE: The initial plan is one
- 23 flare, but there's also a provision for a second
- 24 flare if it's needed as a backup.

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- 1 MS. DIANE SWIDERSKI: I have been
- 2 wondering, too, is there any plans to capture of
- 3 this methane to recycle it and to --
- 4 MR. ROMAINE: At this time Winnebago
- 5 Services has not proposed any plans for productive
- 6 use of the gas. They simply flare it at this point.
- 7 If Winnebago Services decided to go in and recover
- 8 the gas for use as fuel, that would have to be
- 9 separately permitted, assuming that they would have
- 10 a gas engine facility similar to the existing gas
- 11 engine facility that's associated with our existing
- 12 operations.
- 13 MS. DIANE SWIDERSKI: And what are the
- 14 health concerns that we might have regarding this?
- 15 MR. ROMAINE: This facility has to operate
- 16 in accordance with federal regulations that, I think
- 17 the main concern is the fact the proper control of
- 18 the landfill gas to prevent the nuisance conditions.
- 19 MS. DIANE SWIDERSKI: All right. That's a
- 20 huge concern, too. Yeah. All right. And I assume
- 21 they're going to take the steps to alleviate that?
- 22 MR. ROMAINE: Yes. This is a more
- 23 rigorous permit than the permits that were
- 24 previously issued for the existing disposal units.

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- 1 It reflects new developments in continuing
- 2 improvements in steps that can be taken to collect
- 3 landfill gas.
- 4 MS. DIANE SWIDERSKI: Are they going to
- 5 retroact, retrofit some of these older flares to
- 6 these new standards?
- 7 MR. ROMAINE: Not so much the flare but
- 8 the gas collection system, the system that you use
- 9 to make sure that the gas that is generated by the
- 10 landfill actually gets to the flare system rather
- 11 than escaping directly to the atmosphere.
- 12 I'll make a very general statement
- 13 here that Winnebago Services is in the process of
- 14 making improvement to the gas collection control
- 15 system. We have an ongoing enforcement action that
- 16 we hope to resolve at least at the Illinois EPA
- 17 shortly that would require some of those measures
- 18 that are now being required at this new unit to be
- 19 also used at the existing unit.
- 20 Do the representatives of Winnebago
- 21 Services want to add to that at all?
- 22 MR. HILBERT: I would concur that the
- 23 enhancements in the controls and the hose permit are
- 24 identical to what we would be required to do under

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- 1 the agency's enforcement action.
- 2 MR. ROMAINE: Obviously that is not a
- 3 resolved enforcement action. When it is resolved we
- 4 would have to lodge a consent decree and go to the,
- 5 I guess the Winnebago County Circuit Court, it would
- 6 be available for people to look at.
- 7 MS. DIANE SWIDERSKI: Okay. I think that
- 8 does it for me. Thank you very much.
- 9 HEARING OFFICER STUDER: Thank you.
- 10 Kristin Baisch-Ricker?
- 11 MS. KRISTIN BAISCH RICKER: Hi. My name
- 12 is Kristin, K-R-I-S-T-I-N. Middle initial K. Last
- 13 name is Baisch-Ricker. B as in Boston, A-I-S-C-H,
- 14 hyphen Ricker. I am a concerned citizen.
- 15 If I comment tonight, does that
- 16 prevent me from written comment later?
- 17 HEARING OFFICER STUDER: No. You can make
- 18 oral comments and submit written comments. You can
- 19 provide a summary of your comments and supply the
- 20 comments either now or at any time during the
- 21 comment period.
- 22 MS. KRISTIN BAISCH RICKER: Thank you.
- 23 Is there a device that could be used
- 24 off site in real time that would show the amount of

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- 1 heat generated and/or particulate matter generated
- 2 from these?
- 3 MR. ROMAINE: In what sense are you asking
- 4 the question about heat? Are you talking about heat
- 5 generated by the flare?
- 6 MS. KRISTIN BAISCH RICKER: That and/or
- 7 the air quality for that day or that I'm thinking of
- 8 particular weather conditions such as fog or misty
- 9 rain that particulate matter seems to be condensed?
- 10 MR. ROMAINE: The State of Illinois does
- 11 operate ambient monitoring network. The ambient
- 12 monitors though in the Rockford area are located in
- 13 the more populated areas and to the north of
- 14 Rockford is a better location to generally measure
- 15 air quality in the Rockford area.
- MS. KRISTIN BAISCH RICKER: Could one
- 17 possibly considered for the southern part where this
- 18 is really a concern?
- 19 MR. ROMAINE: It could be considered, but
- 20 given the current resources constraints, I don't
- 21 think it's a very realistic consideration.
- 22 MS. KRISTIN BAISCH RICKER: Could the
- 23 current two burners -- maybe you reflected to
- 24 something of this, maybe not; the current two

- 1 burners that are in operation right now, could they
- 2 be upgraded to maybe abide by the same new rules for
- 3 this construction or once they're constructed they
- 4 follow with those permit rules?
- 5 MR. ROMAINE: Again, we're not talking
- 6 about upgrading the burners. The flare at the West
- 7 Expansion Unit would be a similar design to the
- 8 flares at the existing waste disposal area. It's
- 9 the measures that are taken to collect the landfill
- 10 gas that are more rigorous or would be more rigorous
- 11 pursuant to the draft permit.
- 12 MS. KRISTIN BAISCH RICKER: Okay. I live
- 13 very close to the western boundary on 8078 Living
- 14 Woods Drive, Rockford 61109. And I have experienced
- 15 numerous occasions of particulate matter, whether it
- 16 be daytime/evening, metallic sulfuric taste in the
- 17 air, and a definite metal odor with the current two
- 18 burners. There was, it seemed to me, maybe I'm
- 19 wrong, but that there were two burners burning until
- 20 about September of 2012. And then it went down to
- 21 one burner for about two years. And now recently
- 22 another burner has been generated probably since
- 23 sometime last summer, the summer of 2014. Are my
- 24 observations correct?

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- 1 MR. ROMAINE: I think your observations
- 2 are correct in general.
- 3 There were two burners there during
- 4 that time, but they were also operating a gas engine
- 5 facility with a number of engines; that facility is
- 6 no longer in operation. So there's a need to send
- 7 more of the collected landfill gas to flares.
- 8 MS. KRISTIN BAISCH RICKER: Thank you for
- 9 explaining that, because I was unaware of those
- 10 facts until now. Thank you.
- 11 MR. ROMAINE: You're welcome.
- 12 MS. KRISTIN BAISCH RICKER: I think I will
- 13 finish the rest as written comments. Thank you.
- 14 HEARING OFFICER STUDER: Thank you.
- 15 Is there anyone here tonight that has
