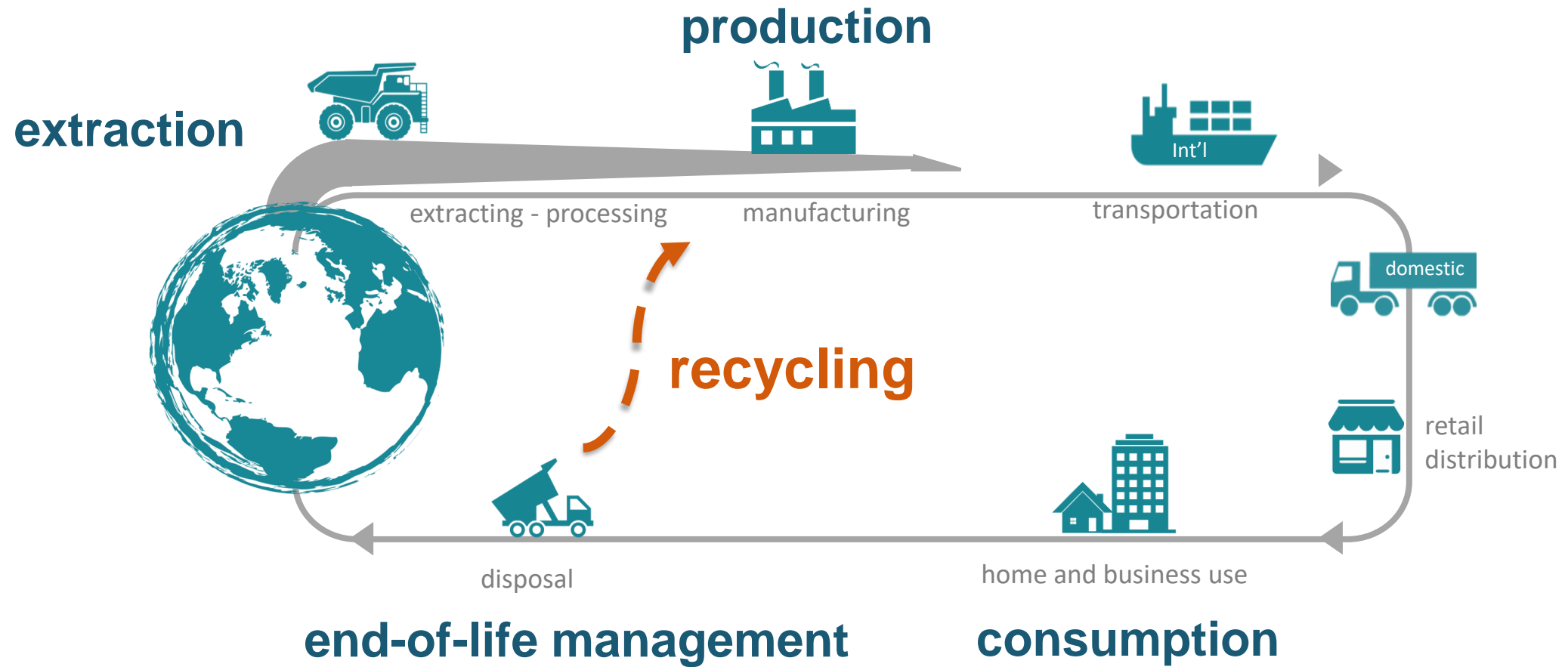

Life Cycle of a Product

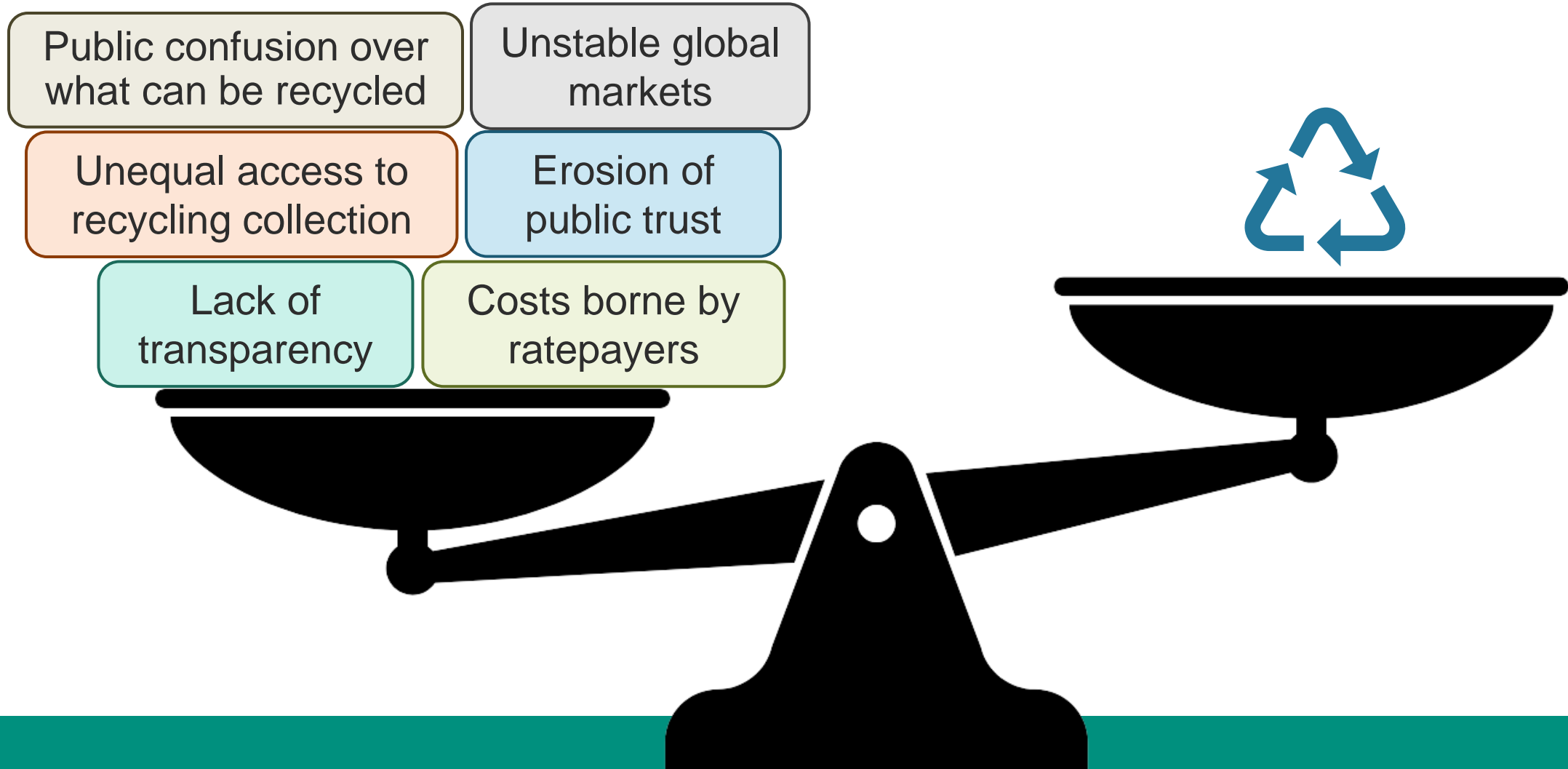

Funding for new services and programming, infrastructure, and transportation.



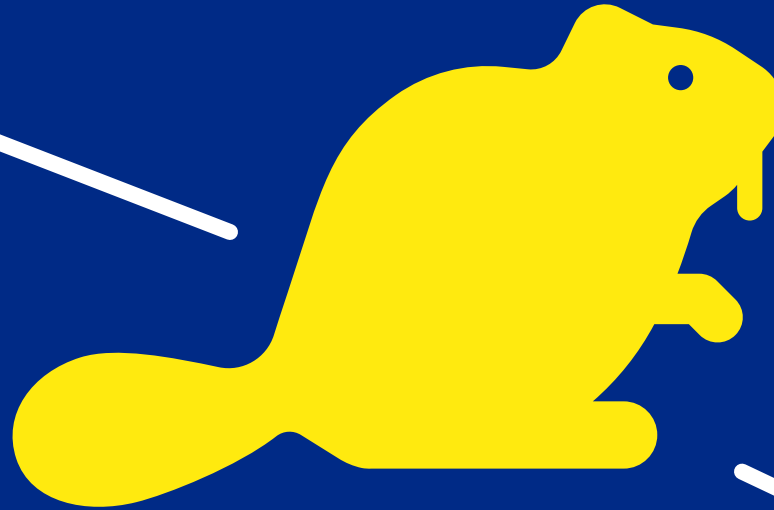
Assurance

- Waste prevention and reuse program

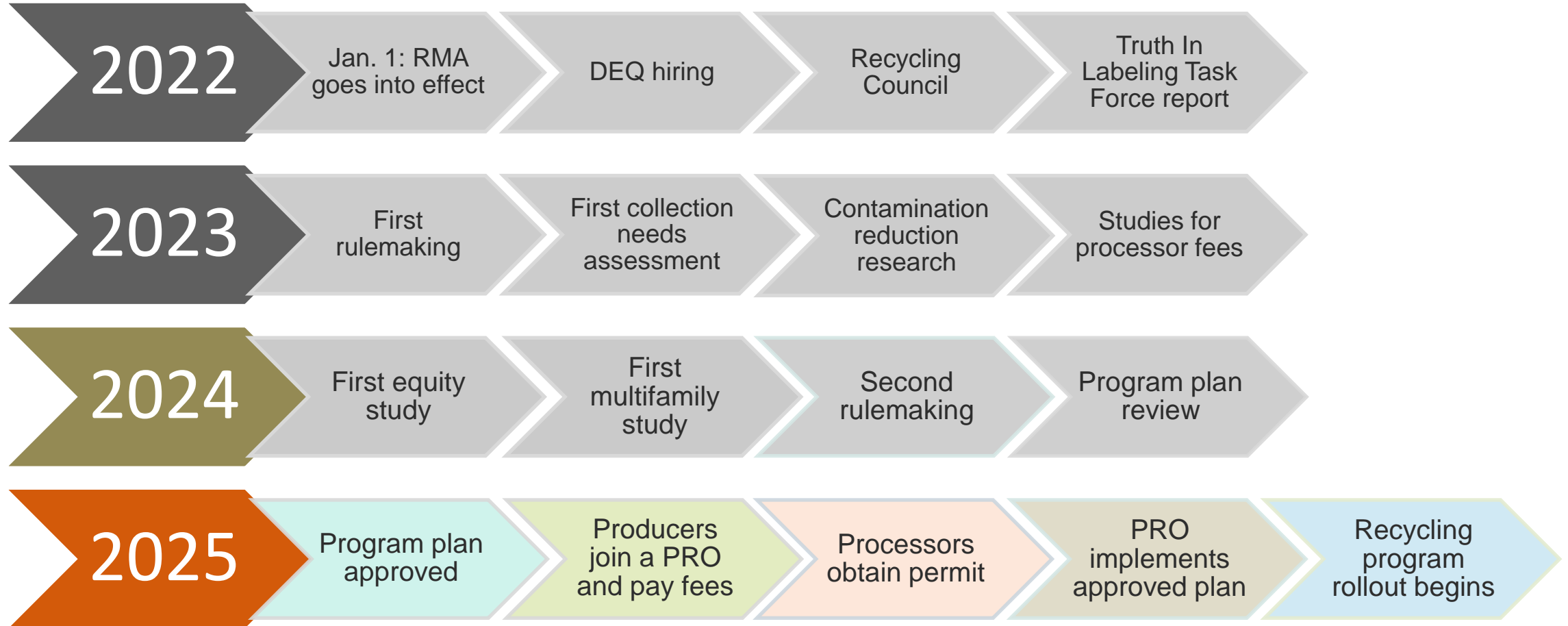


Material Impact Reduction and Reuse Program

PRO-funded program to reduce the environmental impacts of paper, packaging, and food serviceware through means other than recycling

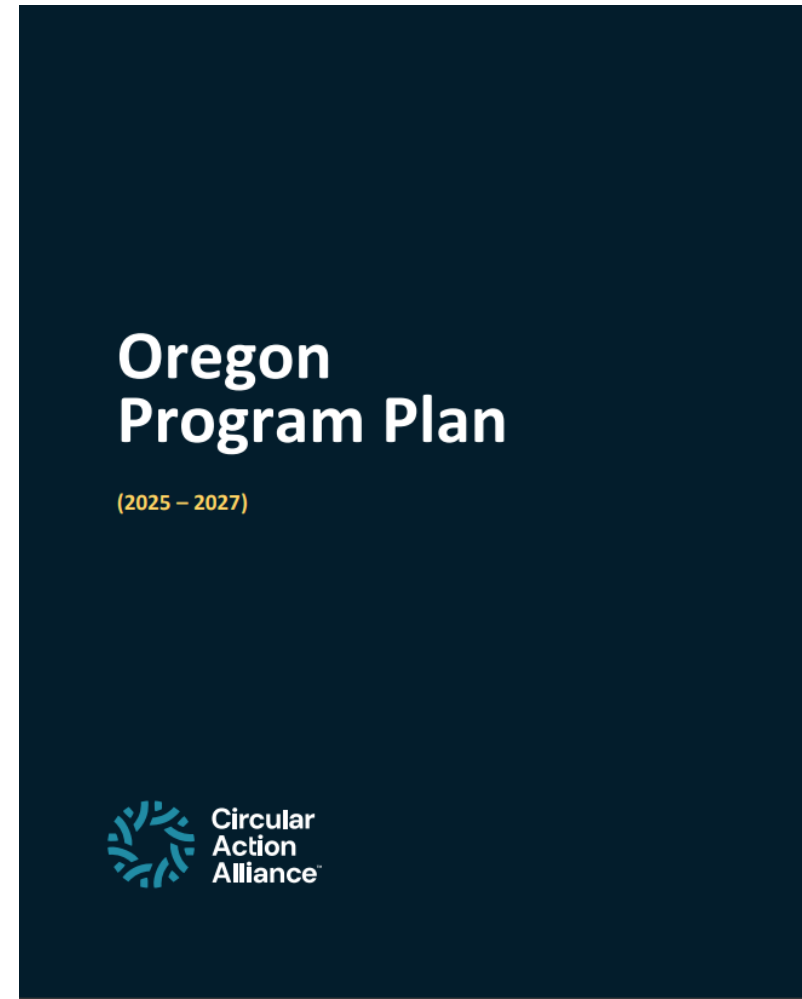


RMA Implementation Milestones



Program Plan

- Enforceable document
- Lays out how the PRO will meet obligations under the law
- Start-up budget averages
~\$183 million per year for first four years
